## LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND BOARD CHAIR

Dear AHS Supporters,

What a great year 2019 was! We closed out the decade with a stronger than ever focus on what really matters to the hiking community. With your help: we fought to increase funding for trails and public lands conservation by almost \$62 million more than the 2018 funding; secured permanent authorization of the Land and Water Conservation Fund; and directly provided over \$3 million of sweat-equity in volunteer labor at local, state, and federal public lands all over the country (including 60 national parks). We even set the world record for the most people (41,424!) improving a trail or park in a single day - on National Trails Day<sup>®</sup>, which itself reached 19 million people on social media.

Along the way, we've been growing the American Hiking family by engaging a younger, more diverse audience in our collective effort to "Empower all to enjoy, share, and preserve the hiking experience". If you haven't yet met our NextGen Trail Leaders, check them out on our website and in our social media. Launched in 2018. each year, 5 new people fill our NextGen Trail Leaders positions and represent the future leaders of the outdoor industry, conservation, and stewardship in America. Our collaboration with Bam Mendiola and Washington Trails Association on Bam's #ExpandtheNarrative takeover of our Instagram account collectively secured us the coveted Outdoor Industry Association "Together We Are a Force Award" for the 2nd year in a row. Each NextGen Trail Leader brings a unique and powerful perspective,

and we urge you to follow them on social media!

We also launched the first Alternative Break scholarship in 2019, awarded to a group whose students, for various reasons, would not otherwise have access or the financial means to participate in a trail service project. Rowan University in Glassboro, New Jersey won the first scholarship, and we are confident that their transformative Alternative Break experiences will inspire future generations to get out and give back to our trails.

At American Hiking, we're lacing up our boots for the roaring 20's decade. Our new 2020-2024 Strategic Plan sets up AHS to continue to expand our role as the leader in empowering the millions-strong hiking community in advocacy for, stewardship of, and protection of the places we all love to hike, and growing an ever more inclusive movement of people devoted to giving back to America's trails.

## **LEGISLATIVE/POLICY WINS**

- Enactment of the most sweeping public lands legislation in a decade!
  - Permanent reauthorization of the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF).
  - Extension of the Every Kid Outdoors Act for 7 years, providing every fourth grader and their families free access to public lands.
  - Extension of the North Country National Scenic Trail.
  - Extension of the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail.
- \$61.99 million increase in trail and conservation funding from 2018.
- Successful American Hiking Society-Partnership for the National Trail System Hike the Hill<sup>®</sup> with 120+ advocates and 110 congressional meetings.
- Advancement in the House and Senate of deferred maintenance legislation and full and dedicated funding for LWCF.
- Formation of joint Justice Equity Diversity and Inclusion (JEDI) Federal Outdoor Recreation Policy Working Group.
- Introduction of Outdoors for All Act and Transit to Trails Act to increase outdoor access.
- Opposed exclusion of public input from trail user groups in the surprise release of an ill-considered, blanket e-bike policy for all non-motorized trails on federal lands.

## NATIONAL TRAILS DAY® Day of service

On National Trails Day<sup>®</sup>, **41,424 people** pledged to give back to the places we love to hike and set the world record for the most people improving trails in a single day. National Trails Day<sup>®</sup> reached almost **19 million** people on social media feeds.

Each year, through Alternative Break, American Hiking Society introduces hundreds of students to service and leadership in the outdoors during their college spring break.

In 2019, as a part of our mission to empower all to enjoy, share, and preserve the hiking experience, we launched the Alternative Break Scholarship program, to help breakdown access barriers in outdoor recreation, stewardship, and leadership.

The Scholarship introduces young people to a world of service and conservation, oftentimes serving as the first extended period these students have spent outside. It provides them with the opportunity to make a difference on our public lands while finding empowerment in the outdoors. "As a typically non-outdoorsy person, I was pleasantly surprised by how much I loved the work we did during our Alternative Break trip at James River State Park.
